

Pre-A Level and University Bridging Courses Summer Term 2021

Pre-A Level courses for Block 5

Block 5 students will be taking a selection of the following courses linked to their Sixth Form programme choices, and continuing their involvement in the Sport, 3i and Co-curricular options with advice from their tutor.

Art

The aim of the course is to re-examine the role of the sketchbook and how it will be used during the A Level course and for those considering applying to art school. The sessions consist of constructing a personal sketchbook, considering format, layout and structure as well as a focus on annotation. Using observational drawing as a starting point, students will explore how they can use the sketchbook to develop their Personal Investigation component of the A Level. This course will support students in developing a drawing project over the summer holiday ready for the start of the course in September.

Biology

There will be three separate strands to the Biology course, each taught by a different teacher. There will be a general transition to A Level course that will look at Cells, Molecules and Human Biology to check that students start the A Level with a firm grounding in these key areas. We will also cover some basic skills and maths - again to give students a firm grounding; and we will also guide students through 'Science in the Media' which has never been as relevant as it is today. The combination of these lessons will set students up for real success in the A Level proper.

Business Studies

Students will come up with and present a business idea to a 'Dragons' Den' style panel. A business plan is a document

created by a business or entrepreneur that provides details about each element of the business. Creating a business plan means an entrepreneur considers all of the different elements of their business.

A business plan is usually made up of several sections:

- The business idea what product or service the business will provide (this is usually the first section of a business plan)
- The business' aims and objectives using the SMART principles
- Target market determined through market research
- Revenue forecast
- Projected costs and profit
- Cash flow forecast
- Sources of finance long-term and short-term finance
- Location where the business will be located
- Marketing mix the four Ps (product, price, place and promotion)

By completing each section of the business plan, an entrepreneur gains a full understanding of each element of their business. This also gives the entrepreneur a better understanding of whether the business is likely to succeed or not. If there is a chance the business might not succeed, the entrepreneur can amend the business plan in order to minimise this risk.

Classical Civilisation

Come and immerse yourself in the world of heroes, war and burial! In preparation for the Classical Civilisation course we will study Sophocles' play *Antigone* which is the tragedy of a woman ruled by conscience, who obeys unwritten law when it clashes with human law. This will be excellent context for understanding the importance of burial in the Ancient World. You will also be doing an individual research project into the genre of epic poetry and will give a presentation in the last week.

Economics

In a world composed of similar people, why is it that we live in relative comfort while over a billion people live on less than \$1 a day? And, more importantly, what can be done about it? This course will help you to try and answer this important economic question. Providing an answer is hard because solving the problem of world poverty is not as simple as reallocating income. It would take \$511 billion a year to increase the incomes of the poorest to just \$2 a day, but calculated in 2003 the G7 countries aspire to give (but do not quite) just \$142 billion a year in aid.

English Literature

Shakespeare and 20th Century Poetry

Your introduction to A Level English Literature will see you immersed in the language and drama of William Shakespeare. You will explore texts that will form important context for your study of Shakespeare in 6.1 and you will develop skills of critical analysis that will aid you in making a smooth transition to your first year of A Level. As part of your introduction, you will also explore a selection of poetry, exploring current themes and concerns in close detail whilst refining your ability to comment on technique and write cogently about poems.

History

"You weren't there, man": The Vietnam War, 1954-1975

Building on the study of modern world history undertaken at BAC, this course will cover the history of the Vietnam War from its origins in a colonial war, through its importance to the Cold War to the final helicopters out of Saigon in 1975. It will use a variety

of different sources – including film, television and literature – to examine the effects on American politics and society, and on Vietnam. This will be a powerful and compelling course to inform, challenge and inspire.

Latin

Students will have the opportunity to engage with the extremely accessible poetry of Catullus and appreciate the tenderness (and bluntness!) of his writing, and explore the ways in which Latin poetry both reflected and criticised the values of the society from which it sprang. We will also study pieces of writing by Julius Caesar. One of the major opportunities which students will have will be to compose sentences in the original language. To do it really effectively, you gradually learn to think like a Roman – and above all, you come to appreciate how Latin writers not only wrote in a different language, but actually thought in a way that is often totally alien to us. Well worth the effort, and nothing like as hard as it might look, as you will see!

Under current circumstances it is more important than ever that you are able to make the transition from IGCSE to A Level without any difficulties and we can use this handy guide as a basis to give all the preparation and background necessary to make a great start to the A Level course. It will look at identifying the key ideas and areas that are picked up from IGCSE; an introduction to the principles of measurement and some essential mathematics to exercise; a preview into some of the areas to be developed and scratch the surface of topics such as field theory,



special relativity and quantum mechanics; an opportunity to air your ideas, stretch your wings and lay some of the essential groundwork to enjoy a successful time in Sixth Form Physics.

Lessons will be led in the target language and there will be opportunities for spoken discussions also.

Spanish

This is a great opportunity to improve speaking skills in Spanish through discussion of relevant and current topics. Students will have the opportunity to expand and secure their grammatical understanding through the practice of advanced structures and topics online. Through the study of a film, students will have the opportunity to develop their critical and analytical skills and to dive into the topics of humour, history, gender roles and tradition, gastronomy, and regional stereotypes in the different regions of Spain and Latinoamerica. A hands-on and proactive approach is encouraged to gain in confidence regarding independent learning, analysis and research. Students will also be required to make presentations, live or recorded, on the researched areas and findings.

Sport Science

This course in Sport Science will focus on the coaching aspects of sport. We aim to introduce the students to national governing bodies and look at how sport is organised in the UK. We will then explore coaching and learning with an emphasis towards the BTEC structure where students will be taught some of the basics before researching ideas with specific reference to their interests. Students will then instruct a small group on sporting skills before reflecting on how the instruction went. As a group we will discuss strengths and weaknesses of the coaching with an aim to improve for the next round of tasks. Thus the program aims to explore the roles, responsibilities and skills required for coaching along with developing personal coaching technique and delivery.

Bridging courses for 6.2

Ancient Greek & Latin

Greek

Through the reading of extracts from three Classical Greek historians, this short course will compare Greek literary styles and use them to illuminate exercises in prose composition.

Roman Britain

Through a study of the first hundred years of Rome's occupation of Britain, looking at both written and material evidence, students will explore the ways that both archaeology and ancient history examine what survives to try to reach an understanding of why the Romans came and what impact they had on native cultures they found. There will be a chance for students to explore an aspect of Roman Britain of their choice, and produce a short written piece on it, from religion, art, architecture, the economy, and the way Roman Britain was governed - and even perhaps the hot potato topic of 'Romanisation'.

Economics

The course will begin by exploring the fundamental question that the subject of economics is concerned with: the allocation of scarce resources, where a scarce resource is anything that is in finite supply relative to demand such as money, time, effort, love and of course goods and services. The course will then develop the fundamental concepts, ideas, methods and models that economists use to study this question in a variety of scenarios and situations. The role of markets and the state in the allocation of scarce resources will be a key part of this course. But there will be much more besides.

French

The French bridging course will focus exclusively on French literature. Students will spend one double lesson reading and analysing one francophone text and a francophone film. The students will also look at French online resources aimed at native speakers taking A Level French in France ('le bac de français'): methodology and stylistic devices. A part of the course will be devoted to translation. Students intending to study French at Oxford next year will read two books from their reading lists and will make a presentation about the analysis of one of them. The course will of course be taught in the target language and is aimed at advanced/near native speakers.

History

Russia 1855-1964

Immerse yourself in the romance, majesty and excitement of Russian History across its most dramatic century. Go from the Emancipation of the Serfs to the Cuban Missile Crisis by way of the Russian Revolution and Stalin's Purges. Throw yourself into the nasty, brutish and short life of the Russian peasant - and then the drama (in so many ways) of Dmitri Shostakovich's *Lady Macbeth of the Mtsensk District*. No previous knowledge of Russian History is necessary.

History, Literature and Film

We shall study all aspects of Russian culture – literature, art, music, film, dance – to gain understanding of the country and its history. Firstly, where we look at the Tsarist period, we shall look at the work of Turgenev, Tolstoy, and Dostoyevsky through their short stories; Chekhov and Gorky through their plays; and Tchaikovsky through music. Secondly, for the age of revolution, we shall look at film through the work of Eisenstein and Dziga-Vertov, literature through revolutionary writers such as Akhmatova, Babel, and Bulgakov, music through Shostakovich, and art through Malevich and Rodchenko.

Mathematics and Further Mathematics

Decision Mathematics

Whether it is game theory, with its applications to finance, or dynamic programming to optimise a company's approach to production, decision mathematics is both a modern branch of mathematics and highly applicable to the world of business. We will explore topics such as route inspection, critical path analysis and linear programming.

Statistical Methods

This course builds on some of the concepts learnt in A Level Mathematics. With the advancements of modern technology, vast amounts of data are readily available and lend themselves for research purposes. This course is going to look at statistical methods underlying scientific research methods.

Group Theory

Group theory is the study of groups: sets equipped with an operation (like multiplication, addition, or composition) that satisfies certain basic properties. As the building blocks of abstract algebra, groups are so general and fundamental that they arise in nearly every branch of mathematics and the sciences.

Music

We will take a look at music from the late 19th century to the mid-20th century including topics such as: Strauss and Mahler - A window on Modernity; Fin de siecle Paris - Debussy and Stravinsky in Paris; The Second Viennese School; Modern music in America; and Post-war trends - Total Serialism and Experimental Music. This will be taught by Doug or Will, depending on timetable requirements.
